Purple Heart Recipient Jason E. Johns

Jason Johns entered the military on August 26, 1994 as a member of the Wisconsin National Guard. During high school in Cuba City, WI, he had volunteered at the local VFW post and in his words, "I learned a real appreciation for our veterans and their sacrifices at a very young age and felt it was my duty to serve my country." In 1995, Johns completed his basic training and advanced individual training as an 88M motor transportation operator. From 1994-1999, he subsequently served with the 229th CSE out of Platteville, WI. He finished his initial service obligation with a military police unit out of Ft. Belvoir, VA, from which he received his first Honorable Discharge on August 26, 2002.

In February 2003, shortly after Johns had returned to Wisconsin, his original unit, the 229th, was activated for service in Iraq. He made immediate contact with his 1st Sergeant who told Johns he needed to hill a team leader slot. Johns did not hesitate and that same evening he reenlisted. He reported the next morning and one day later was on his way to Iraq.

On October 26, 2003, Sgt. Johns was driving the lead vehicle in his platoon's convoy and had just pulled off Highway 1. They were about to assume the duty of searching civilian vehicles at a roadside checkpoint in the Sunni Triangle just north of Samarra, Iraq. He had just parked and was preparing to dismount when his squad mate's vehicle, that was second in formation, his an antitank mine placed the night before under the cover of darkness. Sgt. Johns was hit by shrapnel and was in the line of the direct impact of the explosion.

The concussion knocked him out and resulted in traumatic brain injury, nerve damage to the ear canal, plus additional head and back injuries. He was taken to a field hospital near Tikrit for treatment. After eight days of recuperation, he returned to his unit where he completed his tour of duty.

Sgt. Johns was near the "Spider Hole" on December 12, 2003 when Saddam Hussein, hiding underground in that Spider Hole, was captured. Johns and his unit were base camped just outside of Tikrit, Saddam's home town. His squad had patrolled this area, a small date farm along the Tigris River just across from Tikrit. Sgt. Johns and members of a special operations task force were searching for Saddam when suddenly the words came down, "We got him!" Saddam Hussein had been captured.

In addition to the Purple Heart, Johns was awarded the Combat Action Badge, Army Commendation Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, Iraq Campaign Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Armed Forces Reserve Medal with "M" Device, Meritorious Unit Ribbon, and the Army Service Ribbon.

Sgt. Jason E. Johns received his 2nd Honorable Discharge from the Army on September 4, 2004.

In his time in Vietnam, Vic experienced mortar and rocket attacks on his camps in Da Nang and Phu Bai. He was promoted to a Sergeant E-5 and rotated out a few months later. He was assigned back to Ft. Knox to finish out his active duty time. After his ETS he returned home and went back to BF Goodrich. He stayed active in the Army Reserve and was called back to active duty three more times—twice, to train Infantry OSUT at Ft. Benning, GA: once as a First Sergeant and once as a Command Sergeant Major; and again to attend the Sergeants Major Academy at Ft Bliss, TX. The Sergeants Major Academy is run by the Army but is open to all service and allies. The requirements to get accepted to the academy were stringent. Only E-8's and E-9's could apply and one had to have a minimum of 18 years of service. Only 10% of the top NCOs' are accepted. The Sergeants Major Academy is the highest school in the noncommissioned officer professional development program. After selected to attend, he was invited by the Command Sergeant Major of OCAR (Office of the Chief Army Reserve) to Washington, DC and Pentagon along with 12 other Reservists who were selected. This was in recognition for being selected for the academy. They toured the Pentagon, Arlington Cemetery, Ft. Myer, VA and several monuments including the Vietnam Wall. They ate lunch in the Pentagon and met the Sergeant Major of the Army and several Generals. Vic started the academy resident course in January 1988 in Class 31. When Vic's kids visit him they still talk about how interesting and fun it was living in El Paso and going to Ft. Bliss. They have a lot of great memories.

Shortly after graduating from the academy he was promoted to Command Sergeant Major. His first assignment was Infantry training unit under the 70th Training Division in Flint, MI. Vic spent a total of 32 years 3 months in the Army/Army Reserve, from April 1967 to July 1999. He then retired. All of his service was honorable. Vic said that he had many assignments and experiences over that 32-year period. He is married to Kathy Duesel and they have three adult children and five grandsons, their age range is 4 to 18.

Help Two Veterans Walk from Milwaukee to Los Angeles to Raise Funds for Dryhootch




